Meeting Your Needs

Third Church's curriculum offers a variety of classes for youth and adults. Choose a class that is of interest to you and join us each week. You will find many opportunities to meet and enjoy the company of others interested in growing and learning together, sharing our questions and doubts, as well as our hopes and faith. Adult Faith Development Sunday classes begin at 9:30 a.m. Sundays during the program year. Classes are also offered at other times and days of the week.

All education and worship spaces are accessible via the elevator located near the building entrance to the Arnold Park parking lot. Greeters are available throughout the facility to answer questions and direct you to class locations.

Most classes are recorded and available on audio CD from the Third Church office. This enables you to catch-up on classes you weren't able to join, or even courses from previous years. The Church's library is your source for recommended reading selections, theological works, and select fiction. Visit before or after worship or during church office hours (8:00 a.m. to 4:15 p.m.).

How Courses Are Organized

Third Church Adult Faith Development classes are offered on an elective basis over five terms which span the program year. Some courses span a term of five or six weeks - but this does not require attending all sessions in order to participate. Other courses are shorter, allowing more choice and variety in both length and content. Biblical Studies consists of a core curriculum that explores every book of the Bible. **Even if you cannot make all the class sessions for a course, please feel free to attend whenever you can. Please join us as you are able. Feel welcome to enter a class late or leave early if you need to.**

Each year, the Adult Faith Development Committee offers a balance of courses in each of five areas:

- (B)** Biblical Studies - Old and New Testaments and their Interpretation.
- (CF)** Christian Foundations - Theology and Church History.
- (SOC)** Church & Society - Social Issues, Ethics, and Mission.
- (WM)** Worship, Music, & Arts - Sacred Works, Arts & Literature, Alternative Forms of Worship.
- (LIV)** Christian Living - Family Formation, Spiritual Development.

Each course is listed in one of these five areas, however many courses cover themes that overlap areas. The course area listings serve as a guide to help you plan a meaningful balance of courses over time.

The Importance of Continuing Faith Development

There is something here for everyone, and in today's world, everyone needs to participate regularly in Adult Faith Development in some way. Planning for Your Own Spiritual Growth

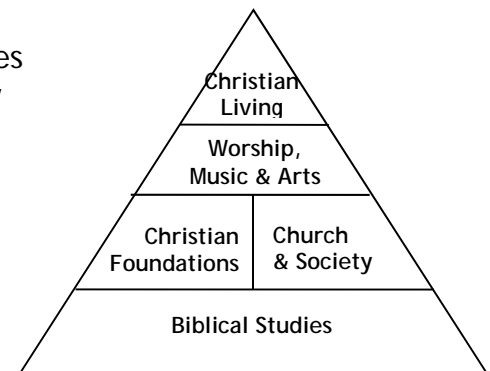

Public Education in Rochester (SOC)

Please join a discussion between persons interested in public education and Bill Cala over dinner in the Celebration Center. John Wilkinson will join Bill to discuss the history of Presbyterian involvement in public education.

As Bill said in May, 2010, "The Rochester Metropolitan area is one of the most income-unequal areas in the country. We have some of the greatest pockets of wealth and the poorest of the poor. While currently not at their 'A' games, the likes of Kodak, Xerox, and Bausch and Lomb have long histories of producing incredible local wealth. Rochester is the ninth poorest city for children in the country and the poorest of the state's big 5 cities. Further, nearly 90 percent of Rochester's school children receive free and reduced lunches. Rochester has the highest teen pregnancy rate in the western world."



William Cala is the former interim superintendent of the Rochester City School District and former superintendent of Fairport schools. He is the president of Joining Hearts and Hands, Ltd., a non-profit organization working to fight AIDS and poverty in Kenya. He earned his bachelor degree in Spanish Education at St. John Fisher College, and both a master's degree in Education and an E.D. in Curriculum Planning and Instructional Design from the State University of New York at Buffalo.

Week 2: What Shall We Call Them? The issues of labels and categories. A discussion that might reveal misconceptions, stereotypes, fears, and apathy.

Kairos Palestine: A Document for the World-Wide Church (SOC)

The *Kairos Palestine* document was released publicly on December 11, 2009, in Bethlehem. The document was written by an ecumenical group of Palestinian Christians (left). As their website declares, it is intended as “the Christian Palestinians’ word to the world about what is happening in Palestine.” Further, it “requests the international community to stand by the Palestinian people.” The term “kairos” is a Greek word meaning a “point in time” or “moment of decision.”

In July 2010, the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) commended for study the *Kairos Palestine* document (“A Moment of Truth”) and endorsed the document’s emphasis. This material will be presented for study throughout October. Each attendee will receive a free copy of the 37-page Study Guide.

Jesus to Constantine: An Introduction (CF)

The Christian movement emerged from its cradle in Judaism and became a successful, established institution in the Roman Empire by the time of Constantine and the Council of Nicaea in 325 AD. But it faced a number of challenges. Beside cultural, religious and political competition within the Empire, Christianity rapidly expanded east to Iran, India, and China, and south to Egypt and Ethiopia well before it became the Roman state religion. The movement took on forms of self-governance while struggling internally with vast theological diversity, commonly known as "heresy." This class will examine the competition to establish an "orthodoxy" of practice and belief amidst several cultures. The class method will rely on PowerPoint presentations so the attendee will experience both visual and verbal learning. All attendees will receive a complete text of each presentation at the end of each class. Back copies will always be available.

It drives the way I live and work." Nancy is a regular participant in the Church Radiant of Gates, a Nazarene Church, but she says, "I consider myself staunchly non-denominational."



Nancy Elliott, LMSW, began at RAIHN as an MSW Intern from Roberts Wesleyan College in April 2008. She graduated with an MSW in May of 2009, and has since been RAIHN's Network Director.

She completed social service internships at House of Mercy, Hillside Family Service of Rochester, Highlands of Brighton, and Family Resource Center. Nancy worked as a Preventive Social Worker at SPCC of Rochester for 3 years, and as a Community Based Clinician at Hillside Children's Center for one year.

Mother Theresa & Gustavo Gutierrez: Two Christian Lives of the 20th Century (CF)

William R. Cook will present the biographies of Mother Theresa of India and Gustavo Gutierrez of Peru on two consecutive Sundays. This is Dr. Cook's first year of teaching in our Adult Faith Development program. He is an active Roman Catholic layman.



William R. Cook is the Distinguished Teaching Professor of History at the State University of New York at Geneseo, where he has taught since 1970. He earned his bachelor's degree cum laude from Wabash College and was elected to Phi Beta Kappa there. He was then awarded Woodrow Wilson and Herbert Lehman fellowships to study medieval history at Cornell University, where he earned his Ph.D.

Professor Cook teaches courses in ancient and medieval history, the Renaissance and Reformation periods, and the Bible and Christian thought. He is the author of the Teaching Company's DVD study, *Lives of Great Christians*.

Among his many awards, Professor Cook has received the Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching. In 1992 the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education named him New York State's Professor of the Year. In 2003 he received the first-ever CARA Award for Excellence in the Teaching of Medieval Studies from the Medieval Academy of America.

This annual class is a much anticipated part of Third Church's weekend exchange program with Temple B'rith Kodesh. This class will focus on current issues of Judaism and Christianity as seen through the multifaceted lens of Presbyterian denominational issues and American/Israel relationships.



Rabbi Laurance A. Kotok, D.D., serves as the Senior Rabbi at Temple B'rith Kodesh. Prior to arriving in Rochester in 1996, Rabbi Kotok served the North Country Reform Temple Ner Tamid of Glen Cove for 22 years. He is currently National Chair of the ARZA Rabbinic Cabinet, serves on the Board of the Jewish Child Care Association, and has been active in both the New York and National UJA/Federation.

The Quest for the Historical Jesus (B)

This class will explore the issue of non-historicity and trustworthiness of the Gospels' portrayal of Jesus in modern research by John Shelby Spong, John Dominic Crossan, Marcus Borg, and of course by Dr. Weeden. Further this class will explore, with pastoral sensitivity, the historical, critical reconstruction of the life of Jesus which leads into a deepening of faith foundation. This class will examine traditional stories such as the birth of Jesus, Last Supper, and the crucifixion.



Ted Weeden returns for a fifth year to our Adult Faith Development program. He received Bachelor of Arts in Divinity from Emory University, and a Doctorate in New Testament from Claremont Graduate School. He is the author of *Mark – Traditions in Conflict*, as well as articles on the Gospel Mark and other New Testament subjects and is a fellow of the [Jesus Seminar](#). Ted has taught at various colleges and seminaries, and has served as pastor to many United Methodist churches. In 1995 he retired from Asbury-First United Methodist Church in Rochester, where he served as pastor for 18 years.

Albert Schweitzer and Christian Mysticism B

This class will be an exploration of the great New Testament scholar, musician and African doctor in relation to Old Testament, Gospel, and Pauline themes about mysticism. Schweitzer wrote several books on Christian mystics and examined the phenomenon of mysticism in several main characters of the Bible. In our technological age of anxiety Schweitzer provides a refreshing perspective on modern living that is an antidote to our creeping utilitarianism.



Charles Stratton received a bachelor's degree from Trinity College in Hartford, CT; studied aerospace engineering at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, NY; and received both a Master of Divinity and a Doctor of Ministry from Princeton Theological Seminary. He served twice as a missionary to Iran, and was Pastor and Pastor Emeritus at The Presbyterian Church in Youngstown, NY. Charles is returning for his sixth year as faculty.

Hot Topic: Muslims in Our World (SOC)

Last year Mara Ahmed spoke on the issue of "Islamaphobia: The New Normalcy." Attendance at her class was the largest of the season. By popular demand she will return. Mara Ahmed is a Rochester resident and sought-out speaker. Mara has a Masters in Economics from the University of Hartford, Connecticut. To see Muslims constantly in the news after 9/11, yet never have a chance to be part of the discourse, was frustrating for Mara, a Pakistani-American Muslim. She felt compelled to make the voices of people like herself heard. This led her to produce the film *The Muslims I Know*, which premiered at the Dryden Theatre in 2008. It was part of the High Falls Film Festival in 2009 and broadcast on WXXI in the Rochester area. The film has been screened on countless university and college campuses and at film festivals in

The Book of Revelation/Apocalypse of John (B)

The *Book of Revelation*, aka, the *Apocalypse of John*, is an unusual and troubling text that has captured the imagination of many people over the generations. The topics that Anne will look at include: the nature of apocalyptic literature, why people are drawn to religiously motivated violent fantasy, other forms of religious violence and the intersection between economic oppression and religion. Anne says, " I think it's a great text to teach because it is so bizarre, yet it actually proposes a quite radical vision of religious and social justice."



Anne Merideth returns for her sixth year teaching at Third Church. Anne joined the University of Rochester faculty in 1995 and is Assistant Professor of Religion, teaching Old and New Testament and Ancient Christianity. Anne is a veteran of the University's archaeological excavations in Israel, and has lectured about the digs and other topics. In 1997, Anne earned the Abraham Karp Teaching Award shared by the Department of Religion and Classics and the Department of History, as well as the Outstanding Faculty Award presented by the University's Women's Caucus.

Hot Topic: The Economics of Health Care (SOC)*Paul McArthur*

Why is the cost of Health Care escalating at such a fast pace? What strategies are being used to reduce costs for Medicaid, Medicare and insured populations? What are Accountable Care Organizations, Health Homes, Care Management Systems, Capitation Payment Systems, High-Deductible Insurance Plans, For-Profit Healthcare Companies, Regional Health Information Organizations? What cost pressures are faced by doctors, health care professionals and hospitals/health care agencies in our Monroe County area? What advantages do our area's health care systems have in this area? How will health systems cope with the aging of the baby-boomer generation? These and other features of our complex health care delivery system will be touched upon in this "hot topic" presentation.



Paul McArthur joined Third Church in 1984 and is currently a member of Session and chair of the Adult Faith Development Committee. He is the Administrator for the Psychiatry Department at Strong Memorial Hospital and the University of Rochester Medical Center. A Bowdoin College graduate, he received a masters in Hospital and Health Care Administration from the University of Minnesota. Paul has an insider's view of how the health care system has changed over the past thirty-five years and the problems confronting it today.

God Views: How God is Seen Through Different Perspectives (CF)*Dane Gordon*

These five classes will focus on the book, *God Views* by Jack Haberler, the Editor in Chief of *The Presbyterian Outlook*, an independent weekly news magazine which analyzes Presbyterian trends and issues. Each class participant may purchase and read the book.
