Dear Friends,

How’s it going? The “it” is construction, of course, and our response to re-location and transition. The answer is a grateful... it’s going great! And it is. Both sides of the equation, the actual construction and our response, are unfolding nicely.

We are very early in the construction process, and actually, much of what is going on is *destruction*. The sanctuary is a big, open room now, pews removed, floor stripped down to the sub-floor. Johnston Hall is in a similar state – the stage has been removed. In the Celebration Center, the ceiling has been removed as has the vinyl tile floor, exposing the very old one-inch individually set tile. Similar work is happening in the Moot Room.

We have established a good relationship with Terry Gardner, the construction superintendent from LeChase who is here all day, every day, coordinating the work of other workers.

As to how we are living with all of this, again, my answer is very positive. We’ve experienced three Sundays at Incarnate Word. I cannot say enough about how wonderful they’ve been – welcoming, accommodating, and enthusiastic for this experience.

Dozens of volunteers – ushers, greeters, musicians, Sunday school teachers, Dining Room Ministry and Food Cupboard volunteers, Qabats leaders, committee members, you name it – are all adapting, being flexible, having good humor. Some of us have discovered, or re-discovered, the education building. We’ve learned that Incarnate Word or the RMSC are not that far away! We’ve actually seemed to enjoy things, at least thus far.

Thanks to everyone – including a wonderful group of staff colleagues – for making this hum along so well so far.

What’s happening with Easter? When we determined how Sunday worship might work with our Lutheran neighbors, we knew that Easter itself would present a

unique challenge. Incarnate Word has its own schedule which needed to be maintained, but our Easter morning has a different profile than a regular Sunday. We brainstormed about different solutions. An exploratory call with the staff at the Eastman Theatre determined that in fact the newly renovated Kodak Hall would be available. The theatre staff has been very accommodating to us in a number of ways, and therefore, after a series of meetings, we decided to take a leap of faith.

Easter worship will be at the Eastman Theatre’s Kodak Hall, Sunday, April 4 at 10:00 a.m.

Lots of excitement has been generated since we’ve made this decision. Perhaps this will be a memorable event for years to come! Perhaps it will be an opportunity to introduce Third Church to the community in a new way.

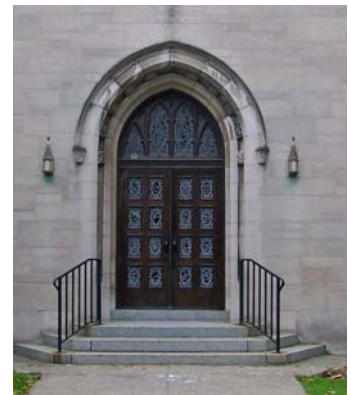
Memorial funds will help defray costs for the morning. That seems to be a good use of resources given to the church in memory of loved ones.

Your spirit will be enriched and renewed.

TREASURER'S BOX



In case you missed the annual meeting/Annual Report, the following is a quick recap of where we ended last year. By year-end 2009, we received almost 103% of our budget goal of \$802,750 for current year (2009) pledges. Prior year (2008) pledge income was even stronger. We received twice as much income as our budget estimate, for a total of \$22,788. Income from contributions with no pledge fell about 32% short of our goal of \$21,000, and our Sunday plate offering receipts were about 19% less than our budget goal of \$13,000. Even though income in these two categories was less than we'd hoped for, we're grateful for the continued good stewardship of our congregation—especially in the face of the uncertain financial situation we faced in 2009. Fortunately, we ended 2009 at 3% over our combined budget goal for these four categories.

On the expense side, actual expenditures totaled \$1,351,270—\$21,140 lower than anticipated. Noteworthy under runs occurred in Personnel, where the number of staff was reduced by two full-time and two part-time people; and in Building, where continued lower utility costs resulted in a \$12,000 savings. Most of the other program areas curtailed their spending as well; we're grateful for their continued good financial management.

In summary, we ended 2009 with a surplus of \$46,800. However, we began 2009 with a budget deficit of \$5,628; when this amount was subtracted from the total, we ended 2009 with a net surplus of \$41,172.

The good news extended to our endowment. According to Rusty Olson's end-of-the-year report, our endowment fund had an investment return of 3.4% for the fourth quarter of 2009, and a 23.2% return for the full year 2009. Contributions to the endowment totaled \$15,746, and imputed income withdrawals totaled \$383,796. The market value as of December 31 was \$4,246,425.

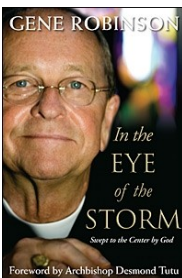

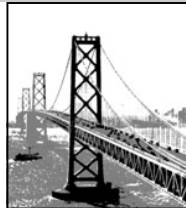

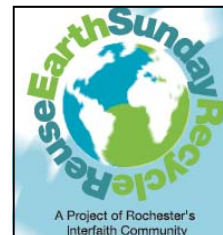
